# A HISTORY OF KELSO HIGH CAMPUS

Kelso High School was opened for the first time on the 27th of January, 1976, as a demountable high school in Waterworks Lane, Gorman's Hill, Bathurst. It commenced with a teaching staff of 16, an ancillary staff of 8 and a student enrolment of 236, divided almost equally between years 7 and 8. The need for this new school had been due to an anticipated increase in the population of Bathurst and it was evident that Bathurst High School would no longer be able to cope with the increased demand for public education in Bathurst.



1978 saw the move from the demountable school into a brand new school at a completely different site, on Boyd St, Kelso. The new school was able to accommodate 1000 students. However, during its first year of opening it only offered years 7-10 and had approximately 500 students enrolled. The school was state of the art and attracted interest from all around NSW.

On Friday the 19th August, 2005, tragedy struck. A fire completely destroyed the school, leaving only one building standing. Following the fire students were located at four different locations throughout Bathurst while a new demountable school was erected. Over 50 demountable classrooms were brought in from all across NSW to ensure that the school remained operational.



Denison College of Secondary Education started operation in 2007. It is a unique partnership between Kelso High Campus and Bathurst High Campus under the leadership of the College and Campus Principals. In 2008, the new buildings of Denison College Kelso High Campus were opened. The new amenities provide the most up to date educational facilities for our students. They were formally opened by the Minister for Education in June 2008.

Denison College caters for over 2000 students, offering a broad curriculum, including shared courses across both campuses, and in partnership with TAFE Western-Bathurst College. Our students have a long history of academic, sporting and creative arts success with outstanding HSC results. Students successfully participate in local, district and state sporting and cultural competitions, including student representatives in volleyball, equestrian and debating, plus locally famous student ensembles Cirkus Surreal (KHC) and Swing Factor (BHC).

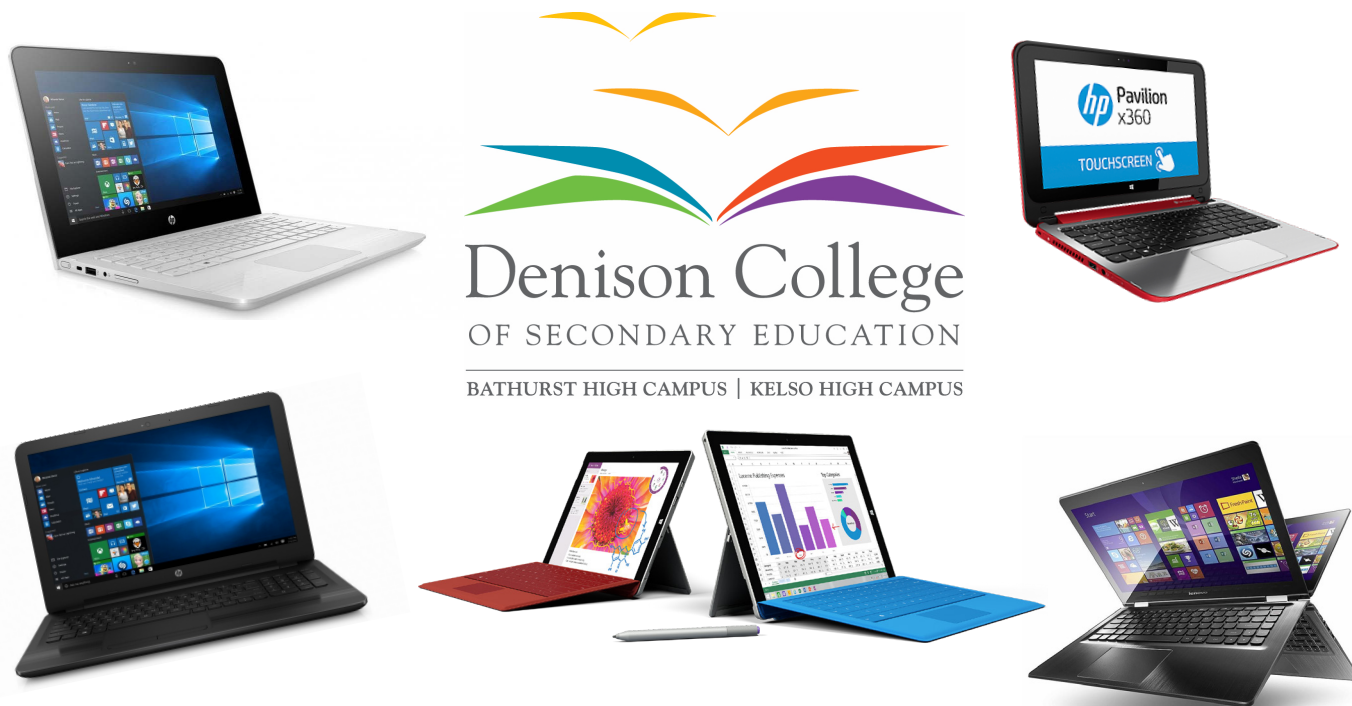

# STUDENT CARE & SUPPORT

## ABORIGINAL STUDENT PROGRAMS

Kelso High Campus offers a broad range of opportunities for Indigenous students. Kelso High students participate in the Girri Girri Sports Academy, with students attending camps, excursions and having the opportunity to work towards achieving specialist credentials, such as First Aid.

Kelso High and Bathurst High Campus representatives attend local AECG meetings and contribute to Aboriginal Education as a group in Bathurst. Our Aboriginal Education Team meets once every three weeks to plan and monitor individual student progress and initiatives to support Indigenous students.

As a school we participate in events central to understanding reconciliation, culture and Identity, such as NAIDOC Week and Sorry Day.

## CANTEEN

The canteen is open every day and the menu is based on Healthy Canteen principles. Students are encouraged to order their lunch before 8:55am to reduce waiting time.

## FIRST AID

The First Aid Officer will contact parents/caregivers in an emergency. Please ensure that all contact details are kept up to date with office staff. Students will be sent home if they are sick. If students have an accident at school, office staff will contact parents. An ambulance will always be called if there is an emergency.

## MEDICATION

If your child requires medication at school, parents/guardians are requested to bring this to the campus and leave your child's medication and instructions for administration of medication with the office. Students who require a Ventolin puffer, or an EpiPen should carry their medication with them at all times. All other medications will be administered by office staff as instructed.

## ROLL CALL

Roll Call is at the start of every day. During Roll Call absence notes are collected and the Daily Notices read. Uniform is checked and marked during Roll Call. Any out of uniform notes need to be handed in during Roll Call.

## YEAR ADVISOR SUPPORT PROGRAM

In 2019 the Year Advisor will be timetabled into every Year 7 class once a fortnight to assist Year 7 to settle in to high school, and to explicitly teach skills around wellbeing and resilience.

## PEER SUPPORT

The Peer Support program helps new student settle in to life at KHC campus. They will attend the Year 7 camp and then conduct peer Support programs in Terms 2 and 3. The curriculum of the Peer Support Program aims to develop self-esteem and confidence and further skills in communication, group work, decision making, relationships and self-awareness. These Peer Support Leaders provide positive role models for Year 7 students and many continue their friendships throughout their time at Kelso High Campus.

# PARENT/GUARDIAN INVOLVEMENT

All parents and guardians are encouraged to participate in the work of the parent focus group to benefit all the students of Kelso High Campus. Research indicates that the more parents understand and are involved in the school, the more successful their children will be in their educational endeavours.

## COMMUNICATION & SCHOOL STREAM



## STUDENT ASSISTANCE SCHEME

The Government has a scheme to assist families in need to help with secondary education. Kelso High Campus has received an allowance which is to be allocated to eligible families to assist with the cost of educating their children. # STUDENT EQUIPMENT & BOOK PACKS

# BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE ENVIRONMENT

The school is fully networked with wireless internet access, two computer labs, computers in the library and class sets of laptops throughout the school. Smart board and data projectors are in use in all classrooms.

Every student has an email address. Students should check their email regularly, as Library overdue notices and other information is emailed to students. In addition, at Kelso High parents and students can log in to the Sentral Portal to view attendance, class performance, upcoming assessment tasks, reports, the school calendar and daily notice and much more. This is available to all students and parents from the time they enrol at Kelso High.

## WEB / INTERNET USE POLICY

When students use the web services of the Department of Education, they must agree to the rules set out in the Web Services Acceptable Usage document:

- I will not reveal personal information including names, addresses, credit card details and phone numbers of myself and others
- I will not give anyone my password
- I will not read other people's emails
- I will tell a teacher if I think someone has interfered with my e-learning account
- If I find any information that is inappropriate or makes me feel uncomfortable I will tell a teachers about it
- I will not sue or distribute material from another source unless authorised to do so by the copyright owner
- I understand that I am responsible for all activity in my e-learning account
- I understand that the school and the Dept of Education may monitor any information sent or received and can trace activity to the e-learning account of specific users
- I will follow the instructions of teachers and use webs services for purposes which support my learning and educational research
- I will be courteous and use appropriate language in all web based communications
- I will not use the Dept of Education web services for personal gain or illegal activity
- I will not damage or disable the computers, computer systems or computer networks of the school, the Dept of Education or any other organisation.

## MOBILE DEVICE (PHONE) POLICY

Communication devices such as mobile phones and MP3 players are an important part of daily life. Inappropriate use of communication devices in classrooms is a distraction and they negatively affect student progress. To support the learning of every student In the classroom Kelso High Campus has revised its Acceptable Use of Communication Devices Policy for implementation from 2018.

Communication devices must be turned off or on silent and in school bags in classrooms and in all formal group situations (e.g.) school assemblies. Students are still permitted to use mobile phones before and after school and during break times. Inappropriate use of devices during these times, such as bullying, unwanted filming or photography, downloading of inappropriate materials and the use of technology to intimidate or harass students is unacceptable and will be dealt with in alignment to the School Discipline Policy. Kelso High Campus expects the appropriate use of communication devices at all times and students must take full responsibility for their own property.

In cases of inappropriate use of communication devices in classrooms, students will be given the opportunity to meet school expectations, however if a student still chooses not to correct their behaviour and put their phone away, a Deputy Principal will confiscate the phone for the remainder of the day in accordance with Legal Issues Bulletin No. 56 (issued April 2015). Contact will be made with a parent or carer. Any confiscated devices will be kept securely in the school safe and can be collected at the end of the school day.



# POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR FOR LEARNING AT KELSO HIGH CAMPUS

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is a College-wide behaviour initiative. It employs a whole school systems approach to address areas of concern within the campus and reduce their effects on student outcomes and on the college community as a whole. PBL encourages positive behaviour from students, which has been shown to improve their self-concept and motivation to learn.

PBL is a long term welfare commitment by Denison College. It is a process which aims to clearly teach students what behaviours are expected of them.

Positive Behaviour for Learning has been implemented in many local schools and is well supported within the Bathurst Schools Education Group.

# ANTI-BULLYING & HARASSMENT POLICY

Kelso High Campus rejects all forms of bullying (verbal, physical, social, psychological and cyber), intimidation and harassment.

Bullying is repeated verbal, physical, social and psychological behaviour that is harmful and involves the misuse of power by an individual or group towards one or more persons.

Bullying can involve humiliation, domination, intimidation, victimisation and all forms of harassment including that based on sex, race, disability, homosexuality or transgender.

Kelso High Campus implements a range of strategies and programs that aim to prevent and address bullying. These include:

- Individual work with students
- Student pastoral support strategies
- Ongoing training for staff
- Explicit lessons for all year levels
- Data collection
- Anonymous box to report bullying
- Peer reporting to Year 10 Peer Support Leaders

Early communication between home and school is critical in providing early support.

## PROCEDURES TO ADDRESS A BULLYING INCIDENT

For Students:

- Use the 'Be Bully Proof' strategies
- When a staff member is told, they have a responsibility to assist to solve the problem
- Serious assault will be reported immediately to executive staff

For Staff:

- Listen and acknowledge the report made to you
- Following the procedures outlined in the Anti-Bullying Flow Chart
- Record all actions in Sentral Wellbeing

# UNIFORM POLICY

Students who take pride in their school represent it with integrity and those who wear school uniform will be entitled to:

- Represent the school in sporting teams
- Represent the school in debating and other academic teams
- Participate in special performances such as drama and Cirkus Surreal
- Participate in extra-curricular school excursions
- Attend school functions
- Participate in and attend reward activities associated with the schools welfare structure, such as merit days and PBL activities
- Receive special awards through the schools rewards and recognition system
- Be eligible for election onto the Student Representative Council
- Be eligible for election onto the School Leadership Team
- Documentation of their support for uniform on their school reports and references

Consequently, Kelso High Campus students are required to wear school uniform. Items can be purchased through the Administration Office, school uniform shop (Daylight) and local retailers in Bathurst.

## **TAS ELECTIVE FOOTWEAR GUIDELINES**

We all need to play a part in ensuring student safety at school. A TAS priority is to follow and maintain good safety practices within the faculty. All students who have elected a TAS subject (with the exception of computing subjects) must wear appropriate footwear for practical activities. Fully enclosed shoes with a leather or vinyl upper are appropriate for TAS subjects.

Footwear such as open weave cloth shoes, shoes with openings at toes or heels, platforms or high-heeled shoes cannot be worn in a workshop, kitchen or agriculture area. They present a potentially hazardous situation.

## **FORMAL VERSUS EVERYDAY UNIFORM**

If your child is performing in school bands, enjoys public speaking, is considering standing for the SRC or leadership team, or is representing the school at functions and events other than sporting occasions, then students are expected to wear formal uniform.

In addition, many students enjoy wearing formal uniform on occasions, which is encouraged. Ties and blazers can be borrowed from the administration office for one-off occasions requiring formal uniform. All other formal uniform items are available for purchase from the KHC Uniform Shop.



## **UNIFORM ASSISTANCE**

If parents or carers have financial difficulties which affect the purchase of uniform, financial assistance is available. Please contact the Principal or Deputy Principals for information

## **FAILURE TO WEAR SCHOOL UNIFORM**

As part of the Denison College - Kelso High Campus Uniform Policy we conduct daily uniform checks during Roll Call. On the second occasion that a student is out of uniform we notify parents and request that they help the school enforce its uniform policy by ensuring students wear the correct uniform to school each day. If for some reason the correct uniform cannot be worn on a particular day, we ask that parents provide a short note explaining the circumstances.

If a student is found to be out of uniform three times in a two week period, this will be followed up with a phone call home and the student will attend a K2 detention. The student will also be precluded from attending non-mandatory excursions, being involved in extra curricular activities and representing the school in sporting and other events for a period of time.

If a student continues to be out of uniform after these interventions without a legitimate reason, they will be referred to the Senior Executive for persistent disobedience.
